Dear Friends,

In October we celebrated a wonderful Harvest Thanksgiving here at St Mary's. Although, sadly, I was absent on that particular Sunday as I had a prior engagement to preach in Edinburgh, I heard lots about it when I returned. Barnardo's thank you all for the response to their Appeal. Don't forget this is ongoing and our box in the porch is there for dried food, cans etc. I assure you that they are very grateful for all we give to them – so *Thank You* – October is a month to give thanks.

Now November is a time to remember. Each year we gather to remember those who dedicated and gave their lives so freely for wars both in the past and in more recent times. We will do this during our worship on the 10th when we will have an act of remembrance within the context of the Eucharist.

I have been asked this month, through the Oil & Gas UK, to preach at the Annual Service of Remembrance which will include the recent Shetland helicopter accident, a sad occasion where family and friends gather together in the Kirk of St Nicholas to remember those

they have loved and lost. The two readings I have chosen for the service are Micah Ch 4: 1-5 and Romans Ch 8: 31 – end. Do spend some time reading these verses when you have a moment. They speak to us of the last days, about judgement and most important of all they include the verse "If God be for us, who can be against us?". This is about that love of God from which we can never be separated, for nothing in the whole of creation is able to take away God's love from us.

What a lovely thought that through the whole of our lives, we are secure in the knowledge that "...we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us".



I leave you this month with a lovely poem of reassurance and remembrance:


Open 4 Prayer

Vestry Report

The Vestry met on 2nd October when the following items were discussed.

The annual stewardship campaign has been deferred until Spring but there will be a gift day in November.

It had been suggested that we might purchase something in memory of Josie Duncan and it was

agreed that there would be a retiring collection taken for this.

Several new pilates classes have started for a total of 6 hours weekly.

The new web-site address and the Church telephone number will be added to the notice boards in the grounds.

New spotlights were fitted in Church recently but it is felt that the light is too white so the electrician is to be asked to come back to fit different bulbs. The roof at the east end of the building has now been repaired but there are further problems as it is thought that some of the downpipes are blocked and also some of them are not wide enough for the volume of water and this may be contributing to the problems round some of the windows in the corridor, Sacristy and toilets.

The Pastoral Care Group hosted a welcome supper to which all members of the congregation who were 'new' since the last welcome supper were invited. Twenty people attended and it was a very successful evening.

The Communications and Publicity Group has prepared leaflets to advertise Friday 'Open 4 Prayer'. Volunteers will be required to distribute these round the offices in the vicinity of the Church.

The BBQ was held on 29th September when £230 was raised. The Silent Auction will be held on 1st November and donations of good quality items are required to make it a success.

Raffle tickets are now available for sale. Anyone who has not received any, please contact Mary Allardyce who will be happy to give you some to sell to family and friends. The draw will take place at a soup lunch on 11th December and donations of items for prizes are welcome. The new web-site is now up and running and looks very good. Thanks to Mary McKinnell and Carol Graham for all of the work they have done on this important work.

The Guild from Holburn West has invited members of Saint Mary's to attend a meeting on 27th November. A list will be put at the back of the Church for anyone interested to add their names to.

The 'Young People's Group' (LEGO group) is now meeting in the Choir Vestry on Thursday evenings at 7.30pm.

The Rector is starting a Film Night at Saint Mary's. This will be held monthly on Wednesday evenings at 7.30pm, the first one being on 23rd October when the film 'Faith Like Potatoes' will be shown.

Illegal parking in the grounds of the Church is becoming a problem. It has been suggested that we put a sign up stating that it is a private area and stickers prepared to place on the windscreens of cars belonging to people who are not visiting the Church or are members of the congregation. More volunteers are desperately needed for some of the duties undertaken each week in Church. In particular, the cleaning rota on Saturday mornings for 1-11/2 hours on Saturday mornings once a month, coffee helpers on Sundays following the 10.15am service for ½-¾hour and sides-people to hand out books and count the offering again for ½-¾hour following the 10.15 service. The more people who do these tasks the less frequently for everyone involved.


