Vestry Report

The Vestry met on 23rd April when the following items were discussed.

The Rector reported that he thought the 150th anniversary celebrations had been very successful. Over 200 people had attended, he had received lots of feedback and it was all positive. The Bishop and the Primus have both written letters of thanks for a wonderful event.

Rails on the steps leading to the Altar have now been fitted and members of the congregation are extremely appreciative. It is good that some people who have been unable to climb the steps can now receive communion at the High Altar. Thanks to Simon Rozario for arranging to have these made and installed.

A sign has been ordered stating that parking within the Church grounds is for private use only and hopefully will be placed near the west door soon.

Jenny Cruickshank is to run a reading workshop following the 10.15am service on 11th May for anyone who might wish to join the reading rota.

The weeds are taking over the grounds of the Church again so the Rector is to contact Pete to ask him to spray weed-killer on them.

Apparently the work done on the roof above the toilets is not satisfactory and water is still penetrating the building. A building surveyor is to be contacted for professional advice.

The paintwork in the Choir Vestry has become quite badly chipped and needs to be repainted. It is hoped that we might manage to do the bottom part

ourselves but the top would need professional input. It may be possible to get a group of people together to help with the painting during July if there are no Pilates classes.

The Rector was in general happy with the attendance during Holy Week and Easter Sunday but some of the services during Holy Week had been very poorly attended.

The Epiphany group are to have a labyrinth in Saint Mary's on Saturday 17th May from 10am – 3.30pm. Members of the congregation are welcome to attend for the whole day if they wish when the suggested cost is £25.00 or free at lunchtime between 1.05pm and 1.35pm.


Going to Switzerland?

34 - If at first you don't succeed, skydiving is not for you.


35 - If your car could travel at the speed of light, would your headlights work?
